Patti Holland, Executive Director

When I started working with The TECHE Project a little over a decade ago, I had no idea that I would be joining a community of inspirational people from all walks of life that share one common vision: a love of Bayou Teche. It's truly amazing to see what our membership-based organization has accomplished in 14 years. We have removed 60 tons of trash from the bayou, an astounding amount considering that the work was done primarily by dedicated volunteers. Many of our trash pickers have been part of the cleanup crew since the beginning. You should be proud of your efforts, as the Bayou Teche Corridor is much cleaner today because of you.

The ecological health of the bayou has improved in several ways through our various programs. The bayou has a thriving population of wood ducks thanks to our many wood duck nest box program participants. Additionally, several of our members and communities have taken the initiative to improve water quality by planting native vegetation along the bank-line. In 2023, we started the annual Geaux Paddle Youth Workshop, which combines paddle training with an understanding of the ecological importance of a healthy waterway.

The TECHE Project's 14th year of operation has turned out to be momentous, as it marks the year that we completed installation of the access dock infrastructure for the Bayou Teche National Water and Paddle Trail. In June of 2023, we installed the last of 15 paddle trail access docks on over 130 miles of Bayou Teche and the Lower Atchafalaya River! We are also proud to announce the completion of another major effort, the installation of over 100 directional signs marking the way for travelers to locate paddle trail amenities. A huge amount of gratitude goes out to all of our partners, including local community governments, parish governments and tourism offices, who helped fund this project. A special thanks goes out to our contractor David Dahlquist, whose tireless efforts literally paved the way to make the directional sign project a reality.

The TECHE Project Council looks forward to the next chapter of our nonprofit's mission to increase awareness of the importance of Bayou Teche as a destination for nature-based tourism. We find ourselves lucky to be blessed with a beautiful bayou that contains the added benefit of rich cultural attributes. Where else can you paddle for half a day on a scenic waterway and then stop in a town for a bowl of delicious gumbo with a side of Zydeco dancing?

Raising awareness of Bayou Teche's beauty, history and culture is what The TECHE Project is all about. As such, we are excited to be hosting our Annual Banquet at the venue of our partner organization NuNu Arts and Culture Collective in Arnaudville. Our guest speaker, art historian Claudia Kheel, will be sharing works of artists and photographers that capture the beauty of our beloved bayou. We hope you can join us at the banquet. We also hope that all of you who share our love of the bayou can find the opportunity to get on the water or visit one of the many awesome communities located on Bayou Teche.

Bayou Operations

In April of 2023, we took part in the state's "Love the Boot" campaign. Our community ambassadors and other volunteers cleaned each trailhead, making them welcoming sites for visitors. We also collaborated with state and local parish/ town officials to install 10 trashcans at our dock sites as part of a Keep Louisiana Beautiful grant. Just this past February, we held a volunteer bayou cleanup with the participation of the Teche-Vermilion Fresh Water District. Our grand total of garbage removed from the bayou is now 60 tons!



Wood Duck Program

In January of 2023, we held a wood duck workshop at the Teche Theatre in Franklin, and in January 2024, we held another workshop at the Acadian Memorial Museum in St. Martinville. Also in 2023, we worked with Boy Scout Andre O'Kelly from Troop 224 to fulfill his Eagle Project, which comprised construction and installation of nest boxes along the bayou and increasing landowner participation. Council member Brent Miller has continued providing helpful nest box rearing



tips via our Facebook page. With all of these efforts, we have increased our nest box rearing program to 61 participants. The wood duck program is now managing close to 100 nest boxes. While we are targeting wood ducks in our program, other cavity nesters are benefiting as well. We are proud to say that in 2023, over 800 wood duck chicks, 90 black-bellied whistling duck chicks and 24 hooded mergansers were produced from our duck rearing program on the bayou!

Bank-line Management

The TECHE Project partnered with the Louisiana Iris Conservation Initiative to plant the third phase of the New Iberia City Park bank-line restoration project. This initiative was aided by New Iberia Mayor Freddie DeCourt, who actively supports bank-line restoration. Currently, over 1,000 linear feet of iris are growing and blooming on the bank at the park. The trailhead bank-lines at Leonville and Poche Bridge were also planted with iris and water-filtering wetland plants by our volunteers in the fall of 2023. We will continue to plant beneficial bank-line vegetation in the future. Bayou Teche National Paddle Trail

The TECHE Project is proud to say that all the major infrastructure features for the Bayou Teche National Paddle Trail have been installed! In the spring of 2023, we completed the last access dock of 15 trailheads along the National Paddle Trail at Poche Bridge. We also completed, with the assistance of local governments, tourism offices and the Louisiana Department of Transportation and Development, a major initiative to install over 100 directional signs guiding motorists to the paddle trail from Port Barre to Berwick.

We are thrilled to see a new trailhead pavilion/bathroom installed by St. Martin Parish in Arnaudville and the impressive pavilion complex installed by the town of Leonville in 2023. Thanks to the initiatives of local governments, the Bayou Teche National Paddle Trail is being supported with first-class amenities.

Nature-Based Tourism

Promoting tourism through low-impact recreation will continue to be a priority of The TECHE Project as we shift gears from paddle trail infrastructure installation to facilitating recreational use on Bayou Teche. To that end, we are participating in an ecotourism network of nonprofits and local government officials with the goal to increase tourism through the creation and promotion of recreational opportunities that offer a combination of ecological and cultural insights. Now that the bulk of the paddle trail infrastructure has



been installed, we are working with Wanderlust Rentals in their endeavor to install kayak rental lockers at key trailheads. If you don't own your own kayak, don't worry, you will soon be able to rent one!

Membership Banquet

Over 100 TECHE Project members attended our 2023 banquet at the newly renovated Albania Mansion, with opening remarks by Jeanerette Mayor Carol Bourgeois. Artist Marla Kristicevich and photographer Kristie Cornell also spoke about their inspiration behind the "Meander Mindset" art installation, which infuses natural elements into a multimedia art exhibit exploring the beauty and culture of Bayou Teche.

Youth Workshop

We received a Healthy Communities Grant from Keep Louisiana Beautiful in 2023 and used the funds to hold our first annual "Geaux Paddle" youth recreation program in June. Ten youth ages 10-14 participated in paddling, a water testing experiment, trash pickup, education on bayou ecology and an art project made from recycled trash over two days. We are already planning another workshop for June 2024!



Outreach Efforts

We presented a booth at the Bayou Vermilion
Preservation Association's Annual State of the River
event at Vermilionville in September and participated in
Atelier de la Nature's Halloween Art and Nature Festival in
Arnaudville. Director Patti Holland spoke at the Vermilion
River Alliance quarterly meeting, and Administrator Erin
Bass consulted on a potential paddle trail in Houma in May.



Shake Your Trail Feather

Our annual fundraiser and celebration of the Bayou Teche Paddle Trail continues to be an astounding success. Over 175 paddlers attended the 2023 floating parade. Live music with Corey

Ledet and his Zydeco Band brought a crowd of feather-clad merry makers to Parc des Ponts in Breaux Bridge, where we auctioned a kayak donated by our friends at Pack and Paddle. Special thanks go out to all our festival supporters who make Shake Your Trail Feather so successful. We will continue to host this event each fall. The next celebration will be October 19, 2024, and we hope to see you there!


Contributions by Donor Type



Download the planner from our website or pick one up at a tourism bureau or visitors center in St. Landry, St. Martin, Iberia or St. Mary Parish.




PADDLE TRAIL MAPS

BANK-LINE MANAGEMENT GUIDE

The TECHE Project has also produced a Bankline Management Guide for landowners that details bank-line restoration techniques and provides insight on appropriate plants and where to acquire them. The guidebook also addresses other landowner concerns such as sewerage treatment, groundwater retention measures and nuisance wildlife control.
